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Part I: Abraham

Introduction: Abraham's journey shows how God uses imperfect people for divine purposes. Despite his flaws and doubts, Abraham was used by God in remarkable ways.

Scriptural Foundation: 2 Peter 1:3-4: "His divine power has given us everything we need for a godly life through our knowledge of Him who called us by his own glory and goodness. Through these, he has given us his very great and precious promises so that through them you may participate in the divine nature, having escaped the corruption in the world caused by evil desires."

Abraham's Background and Calling:

Reflection Questions:

2. How have you experienced God's faithfulness in your life despite your fears and doubts?

3. Identify one fear or doubt that holds you back in your faith journey.

4. Write a prayer asking God to help you overcome this fear, trusting in His faithfulness.

Discussion:

- 2. How can we encourage others to trust in God's promises and faithfulness?

4. Identify one way you can better balance service and devotion this week.

5. Write a prayer asking God to help you prioritize your time with Him.

Temporary vs. Eternal Mindset (2 Corinthians 4:18):

"So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal."

Discussion Points:

1. How can shifting our focus from temporary to eternal change our perspective on daily challenges?

2. How does viewing life as a dot on an infinite line representing eternity affect your worries and anxieties?

3. Write down a current worry or anxiety and pray for an eternal perspective on it.

God's Love for Families:

Read John 11:1-26

Discussion Points:

1. How do we understand and trust God's timing in our lives?

2. How can we balance expressing our true feelings with maintaining faith in God's plan?

3. How does believing in the promise of resurrection and eternal life provide hope during difficult times?

4. Share an experience where you had to trust God's timing.

5. Write a prayer expressing your trust in God's timing.

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Jesus Wept:

Read John 11:32-36

Discussion Points:

1. How does Jesus' empathy for our struggles show in His response?

2. How can we find comfort knowing that Jesus understands our pain and sorrow?

3. Reflect on a time you felt Jesus' empathy in your life.

4. Write a prayer thanking Jesus for His empathy and understanding.

Conclusion and Reflection:

1. What small acts of service can you offer to God today despite your difficulties?

2. Reflect on how you can respond to God's divine calling, even amidst challenges.

Prayer: Spend time in prayer, casting your anxieties on God, and asking for strength to maintain an eternal perspective. Reflect on how you can serve God with what you have, trusting in His divine power to work through you.

Scripture:

Reflection Questions:

1. How have you seen your faith evolve from private to public expression?

2. What are the challenges and rewards of standing up for your beliefs in a potentially hostile environment?

Group Discussion:

1. Discuss a time when you stood up for your beliefs. What was the outcome, and how did it affect your faith?

2. How can we support each other in taking a stand for our faith?

3. Identify a situation where you can stand up for your faith and plan how to approach it.

Nicodemus's Legacy:

Key Scripture:

John 19:38-39: Nicodemus, along with Joseph of Arimathea, took responsibility for Jesus's burial, bringing expensive spices and showing honour to Jesus even in death.

Reflection Questions:

1. What sacrifices have you made in your journey of faith, and what have you learned from them?

2. How does Nicodemus's willingness to honour Jesus challenge your own level of commitment?

Group Discussion:

- 1. Share a sacrifice you made for your faith and how it impacted your spiritual journey.
- 2. Discuss ways to honour Jesus in your daily life.
- 3. Write a commitment to honour Jesus in a specific area of your life.

Conclusion: Nicodemus's story highlights the importance of moving beyond surface-level religious observance to a deeper, transformative relationship with Jesus. His journey illustrates that true faith requires not only knowledge but also a willing heart to embrace and act upon divine truth.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, thank You for the example of Nicodemus, whose journey from skepticism to faith challenges us to fully embrace Your transformative power. Help us to move beyond mere religious rituals and experience a deep, personal relationship with You. Grant us the courage to stand firm in our faith and live out Your truth in all we do. Amen.

Part 6: Peter

Introduction: In this final section of this bible study series, we will discuss Peter, one of the most dynamic figures in the New Testament. Despite his flaws and mistakes, Peter was used by God in extraordinary ways. In this session, we'll explore Peter's human weaknesses and divine call, seeking to understand how God can use us despite our imperfections.

Scriptural Foundation:

2. Create a "Faith Journey" timeline. Mark points where you took significant steps of faith and note the challenges and how you experienced God's intervention.

Peter's Misunderstanding:

Read Matthew 15:15-16

Reflection:

1. Share a time when you received correction or feedback. How did you handle it, and what did you learn from the experience?

2. Share a scenario where one person gently rebukes another in love, and practice receiving and giving correction with grace and humility.

Peter's Confession:

Read Matthew 16:13-19

Discussion Questions:

1. What significance does Peter's confession have for understanding Jesus' identity and mission?

2. How did Jesus' declaration about Peter's role impact Peter's sense of identity and mission?

3. In what ways does Peter's role as the rock and holder of the keys illustrate God's plan for using flawed individuals for His purposes?

Reflection:

1. Reflect on how understanding Jesus as the Messiah impacts your own faith and mission in life.

2. Write a personal mission statement based on your faith in Jesus as the Messiah and share it with the group.

Peter's Rebukes Jesus:

Read Matthew 16:21-23

Discussion Questions:

1. What motivated Peter to rebuke Jesus, and what does this reveal about his expectations and understanding of the Messiah?

2. How does Jesus' response to Peter's rebuke illustrate the importance of aligning our expectations with God's will?

3. How can we guard against the temptation to impose our own understanding on God's plans?

Reflection:

1. Have you ever struggled with understanding or accepting God's plan for your life? How can you better align your expectations with God's will?

2. List areas where your plans differ from God's and write prayers asking for alignment with His will.

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Peter's Confusion:

Read Matthew 17:1-5

Discussion Questions:

1. What does Peter's impulsive suggestion at the Transfiguration reveal about his understanding of the event?

2. How did God the Father respond to Peter's words, and what can we learn from this divine intervention?

3. How can we avoid speaking out of turn or misunderstanding God's work in our lives?

Reflection:

1. Reflect on moments when you may have spoken or acted impulsively in your faith journey. How can you seek to be more attuned to God's guidance?

2. Practice a "Pause and Pray" technique. Before speaking in group discussions, take a moment to pray for God's guidance.

Peter's Denial:

Read Matthew 26:31-35

Discussion Questions:

1. What does Peter's denial reveal about human weakness and the struggle to remain faithful under pressure?

2. How did Jesus' prediction and Peter's denial fulfill Jesus' prophecy and demonstrate His foreknowledge?

3. What can we learn from Peter's experience about repentance and grace?

Reflection:

1. Have you ever faced a situation where you failed to stand firm in your faith? How did you experience God's forgiveness and restoration?

2. Write a letter to God expressing your repentance for a time you failed to stand firm in your faith, and ask for His forgiveness and strength.

Jesus Restores Peter:

Read Luke 22:31-32; John 21:20-22

Discussion Questions:

1. Why do you think Jesus specifically prayed for Peter, and what does this tell us about the spiritual battle and divine support?

2. How does Jesus' restoration of Peter after his denial reflect the depth of divine forgiveness and grace?

3. What is the significance of Jesus' command to Peter to "follow me" despite his past failures?

Reflection:

1. Consider how Jesus has restored and forgiven you in your own journey. How can you follow Him more closely, embracing His grace and calling?

2. Create a "Restoration Journal." Write about how Jesus has restored you in various aspects of your life and reflect on His grace.

Conclusion: Peter's journey from a flawed disciple to a foundational pillar of the church illustrates the transformative power of divine grace. Despite his human flaws, Peter was used mightily by God. We are encouraged to embrace our calling and rely on God's grace, just as Peter did.

Prayer: Pray for strength to follow Jesus faithfully, for understanding of your own calling, and for the grace to overcome any shortcomings. Ask God to use you in His divine plan, just as He used Peter.

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
